The order of things: a workshop on taxonomy

Proposed by Nina Liebenberg

Duration: 14 – 18 July (full days 09.00 – 16.00, includes lectures and practical sessions), exhibition run 24 July to 17 August (de-/installation, walkabouts)

Overview:

Investigating ideas and systems of display, archiving, classification, storage and curatorship, this workshop aims to familiarise students with the concerns of exhibition making with a focus on taxonomy as a tool to engage with collections on a creative and critical level. Through the reappraisal of traditional methods, students will be encouraged to use alternative devices of appropriation, mimicking and reinterpretation, to renegotiate meaning.

As a broad-ranging device, discussions will ensue around various topics which include: a historical overview into the nature of collecting – from the Wunderkammer to contemporary artists using the museum as medium; the digital archive and its potential as curatorial device for cross-pollination, information and re-curating existing collections; artists' discussions of their work; the politics of renegotiating old systems of classification in relation to a medical collection; the shifting process of classifying the natural world; and the taxonomy of metaphor in relation to museums of fiction.

Along with various speakers from numerous disciplines, the workshop will also include a culinary exploration into the innovative historical food pairings of West Coast chef and forager, Kobus van der Merwe, tastings sourced from Niki Segnit's *Flavour Thesaurus* and discussions around the numerous artist/curator-run restaurants ranging from Marinetti's La Taverna del Santopalato to Ulrich Krauss's Zagreus Project. Peter Greenaway's *A Zed and Two Noughts* will be on show on Thursday, 17 July.

During the afternoon sessions, students will implement the various methods discussed in the morning sessions to curate different collections. These exercises will result in a exhibition running from 24 July to 17 August in The Bindery.
